World Challenge

Christchurch, New Zealand. They worked very hard and by the time they left we had a miniature soccer field with goals and a swing set.







Kimsy and Sopheak were in charge of running the World Challenge camp. Kimsy and her sister ran the kitchen and Sopheak helped the boys with tools needed and kept the camp site running smoothly. Sothea came from Phnom Penh to join in and help. Andrew and the rest of his crew were in Kampot working on a house. I had Bemore volunteers staying in the bunkhouse and

working in the school. Choun and I kept the home fires burning so it was up to Sopheak and Kimsy to look after our World Challenge visitors. We are very proud of them, they took on the challenge of something very new and different for them and rose to the occasion. Well done!





Our Class 4 attended a party on Saturday night and they taught the boys Khmer dancing. It was great fun, everyone joined in, even some of our shy girls.





We made a makeshift kitchen out of one of our compost bays which has never had compost in it. Worked OK. We had to enclose it with bamboo sheets in case of rain.



World Challenge are school groups from Australia, New Zealand and England who travel around Cambodia, Laos and Vietnam for 28 days. They choose a country they want to do their project in for 6 days and World Challenge allocates them a place to go. They also pay for the materials needed to complete the project that they are working on. We attempted to introduce them to as many cultural differences as possible eg food, dancing, people. All in all a very successful visit. Thank you very much Shirley Boys High School for your contribution to Kep Gardens.

We are looking forward to two more groups in August from England, a day apart from each other. These visits should see a volleyball court, sandpit, balancing beams, stepping stones, all sorts of things in the playground. The students are loving it. Not only do they have equipment to play on and with but they get to meet and play with many other people that don't get tired of kicking the ball and pushing the swing!!

At the moment the playing fields and playground equipment are restricted to Kep Gardens' students only. Eventually it will become a community facility but we have a few logistical problems to sort out before we open the gates to everyone. Once we overcome these problems we envisage an official opening of the area to welcome the community.

BeMore World Mapping

A group of 16 teenagers from The Netherlands visited for two afternoons and evenings playing games and doing various activities from face painting to playing twister with the students. We had a similar visit last year and this year 2 of the young people on that trip have returned as volunteers, not to Kep Gardens but to other projects in Kampot.

Visit from Liger

Liger is an NGO in Phnom Penh who toured the country and chose 50 of the brightest 9 year old students from rural state schools. They took them back to Phnom Penh where they receive a western education. They will attend universities overseas but are expected to return to Cambodia to use their skills for the betterment of their country. One class had been studying electricity and the safety aspects. They came on a field trip to Kep and visited our school to give their presentations. They made books, powerpoint presentations, took small groups and talked about electrical safety in Khmer. We were all very impressed with the group and thank Liger for including us in their field trip. We hope to see them again soon.

Dental Clinic

As last year, the Buddhist Library Mobile Dental Clinic visited Kep Gardens for a week. Again, not only our students and staff but another monk's school students were treated over a 5 day period. Not so many had to go back this year but after 2 extra visits we still have 4 students left needing more treatment. A big thank you to the dental clinic for providing this service for us. There would be many more sleepless, toothache nights without your help.

Pretty tough kids. No injections for fillings or if they take out small teeth. But they do give an injection for bigger teeth needing extraction. Next year we will have an information day a week or so before the Dental Clinic visit as this year there were a few rumours going around about upper teeth attached to your brain and if they get pulled out, it affects your brain; the clinic just takes out teeth and you have lots of problems after. So we have to try and knock these rumours on the head as some did not attend this year because of them.





Trade Skills

I said earlier that while World Challenge was here, Andrew and his merry band of men were in Kampot working on a house. They took it down a few months back (see April newsletter) but now are putting it back up, adding bathrooms, electricity etc. Should be great when it is finished.

Workshop and Storage Area

Meanwhile, our workshop and storage area has been put on hold as the house in Kampot has to be finished. We did brick up the chicken shed for two reasons. Firstly, so that the chickens won't get stolen when they eventually return to their home and secondly, to provide an undercover eating and gathering area for World Challenge. It came in handy a few times.



We also built a toilet area for the visit and will have another completed before the next group arrives. We will eventually put the electric wires underground but a week of bad weather hampered our preparations and we ended up in a bit of a rush to get ready for the first group.

Bracelet Making


