Library System

YES, Kimhour and I did get the library system up and running ready for Term 1. Nothing like a computerized system for a library in the middle of the jungle!! Thank you to the Yankalilla Area School for that and also Craig who set the system up for us so we just had to input the data. They probably don't remember because it was so long ago but we have finally done it.

Lucky Iron Fish

We held workshops a couple of weeks ago for the community to learn of a simple, no cost way to increase their daily iron intake. 60% of Cambodians are iron deficient and the Canadians have come up with a way to address this issue.



The boxes that the fish are sold in are handmade by handicapped people in Siem Reap.
Unfortunately the date we picked landed in the middle of rice harvesting, something which we are unable to control. We have 20 families interested so far and know of many others that were unable to attend. We will be holding another workshop in February. Davuth not only gave the workshops but also told Class 3a, 3b and 4 about the advantages of using these fish which hopefully they will pass onto their families who in turn will come in February. When families cook soup or boil water they place the fish in the pot. A certain amount of iron leeches out into the

fluid which people then drink. If they use it 3 times a day they will receive almost all their daily requirements of iron. It has been tested, found to be quite safe and works if used regularly.





Dara, one of our ex-students received staff training from Davuth and will be handling the follow-up visits to the families. He will visit them 2 weeks, 3 months, 6 months and 12 months after the workshop with a questionnaire, providing research back to the Lucky Iron Fish people.

We needed to buy the fish and pay Dara for his follow-up visits. We cannot thank The Rotary Club of Noarlunga enough for agreeing to sponsor this project for us. Noarlunga is a suburb of Adelaide, South Australia, where we come from. Thank you to Moira who is a member of this club and acted as our go-between.

Sports Days

We have had two sports days recently, one week after another. We really need to increase our

training hours but it is difficult to fit in with local school times. The most important things is that the students are participating, learning team work and enjoying themselves. If we achieve this we have reached our aim. Thank you to Vanna for coming out on Saturday and Sunday afternoons for a couple of hours to coach the students.

We played Our School at Phnom Voar last week. Phnom Voar is a very poor area where the government originally settled ex-Khmer Rouge soldiers in the 90's. Today we played MCS, a French organization not far from the local high school. The girls did it! They won their volleyball competition 3-2. Congratulations.



World Challenge

Como Secondary College from Perth, Australia, visited us at the beginning of December. They did many jobs around Kep Gardens such as repair and maintenance on the playground, pathway to the mess hut and painting of 3 Kep Gardens signs to be erected on the major roadways. The big job was walkway borders, garden beds and pots, laying gravel screening in front of the school house, eating area, kitchen, our house etc. It looks fantastic but most important of all it will stop the dust and heat reflection during the hot, windy season. On top of this they participated in our Reading and Conversation Programme in the mornings and afternoons as well as helping Class 4 with their debate topics. They never stopped working. Thank you very much Como for your hard work. It was a pleasure meeting and working with you all.


















Early Childhood Training
